As hockey coaches were are faced with many of the same challenges. Former Air Force General William Cohen lists eight laws of leadership in his book "*The Stuff of Heroes*". His list is as follows;

- 1) Maintain Absolute Integrity
- 2) Know Your Stuff
- 3) Declare your expectations
- 4) Show Uncommon Commitment
- 5) Expect Positive Results
- 6) Take Care of Your People
- 7) Put Duty Before Self
- 8) Get Out In Front

Great leaders influence others through passion, integrity, trustworthiness and loyalty. They do what is right regardless of the risks or costs. They do not do it because they think it will help them win or give them an advantage. They do it because it is the right thing to do.

As you prepare for the up coming season spend a few minutes on the list of eight. How do you measure up against that list? Where can you get better? The young people that you coach this season will learn more from your behavior and actions than your words.
