Introduction

Welcome to the Ice Wolves Youth Hockey Association (IWYHA). Our youth hockey association provides boys and girls in the Dodgeville, Mt Horeb, and surrounding communities in southwestern Wisconsin the opportunity to participate in the sport of youth hockey.

The Ice Wolves Youth Hockey Association was formed in 2000 when the youth hockey programs in Mount Horeb and Dodgeville merged. Our home rink is inside Ley Pavilion, Harris Park, Dodgeville, WI. Ley Pavilion owned by the city of Dodgeville is leased to the IWYHA for the purpose of providing skating and hockey opportunities. Equipment needed to assemble the rink, locker rooms, concession stand, and the zamboni are owned by the IWYHA. Our Association members and friends assemble the rink each October and disassemble each March.

The Association's activities are carried out by a Board of Directors and a number of different committees. All activities are governed by the Association's bylaws. The board generally meets once a month during the Ice Wolves hockey season and twice a month during the summer to prepare for the following season. Parents are invited to attend any of the board meetings, but should first verify the date, time, and location. Notification of board meetings and minutes of previous meetings can be found on the Ice Wolves website at www.iwyha.com.

The Ice Wolves Youth Hockey Association is operated entirely by parent volunteer help. As a parent you will be called upon to participate in the operation of the Association. Committee work includes fundraising, rink set-up and tear down and more. Parents are also needed to serve as team reps, coaches and board members. Please consider where you can contribute to benefit our Association. Your involvement will offer opportunities to meet other parents in the Association, and you will experience the satisfaction of providing the highest quality youth hockey program for all of our skaters.

The remainder of this handbook provides additional details concerning the operation of the Ice Wolves Youth Hockey Association and youth hockey in general. We hope this information will help you have an enjoyable and successful hockey season.

Goals of the Ice Wolves Youth Hockey Association

Our goal is to provide an organization and environment that allows youth hockey players the opportunity to grow as individuals and develop hockey skills by:

1. Giving skaters the opportunity to participate in competitive hockey regardless of their skill level.
2. Encouraging skaters to achieve individual and team goals through positive reinforcement.
3. Providing practice and game facilities that are safe and always supervised by qualified coaches
4. Promoting the ideals of teamwork, competition, sportsmanship, and fair play in victory and defeat.

5. Encouraging parent involvement and guidance in helping skaters achieve their individual and team goals.
6. Teaching skaters the importance of practice time and proper equipment.

Youth Hockey's Organizational Framework

The IWYHA is a member of the Region Four Youth Hockey Council, which represents youth hockey associations in south-central Wisconsin. IWYHA teams participate in leagues within Region Four Youth Hockey Council during the season. There are six regions in the Wisconsin Amateur Hockey Association (WAHA). WAHA conducts state playoffs within each region, in order to qualify for the WAHA State Tournaments in March. WAHA is an affiliate of the national organization, USA Hockey. Each of these bodies has rules governing the sport of youth hockey.

Ice Wolves' Organizational Structure

The Board of Directors is the governing body of the IWYHA. A listing of the 2011-2012 Board of Directors and Association contacts can be found in Appendix A of this handbook.

Officers are elected by the membership at the annual meeting of the Association held in April, and non-officer positions are nominated by the nominating committee and approved by the Board prior to the annual meeting. IWYHA committees include the following: Nominating Committee, Financial Committee, Rink Management Committee, Recruitment & Retention Committee, Coaching Committee, Public Skate Committee, Rental Equipment Committee, and other ad hoc committees. To serve as a Board member or on a committee make your interest known to the IWYHA President or any current Board member.

Age Levels

Ice Wolves policy, and that of all organizations in Region Four, requires skaters to participate at the level specified by USA Hockey. The following Age Classification Chart shall apply for the 2011-2012 season:

15 and up	1996 and prior	Midget (High School)

*The Learn to Play and Wolf Pack are Ice Wolves programs for boys and girls ages 4-8. They are not a designated USA Hockey age level/program. They do incorporate what the Ice Wolves have traditionally referred to as the "Atoms" and "Mites" and more recently Hockey KIDS I and Hockey KIDS II. See Appendix B for a complete program listing. If you have questions about the best placement for your child contact the Association Coaching and Education (ACE) Director.

Skill Levels

The IWYHA has been designated as a Division 4 Association by WAHA. There are a total of four Divisions in WAHA, with the largest associations generally in Division 1. This means that the

most skilled IWYHA team at each age level must play at the 4A level in the WAHA State Tournament. The second team at each age level must play at the 4B level. Ice Wolves teams Squirt level and higher participate in the Region Four League. WAHA classifications do not determine league assignments in Region Four. Region Four League games are based on relative skill levels of each team compared to other teams at the same age level. If the Ice Wolves first team is competitive with the first teams from most other associations in Region Four, that team will compete at the highest level in Region Four league play. However, if that team would be more evenly matched by playing second or third teams from other Region Four associations, it will be scheduled to play those lower skill level teams.

Parents and coaches, as a group, decide on the number of tournaments they will play during a season. Tournament fees are in addition to IWYHA registration fees.

Fees

See Appendix B for registration fees and work deposit fees assessed for each program/age level.

Scholarships

The Association offers a limited number of scholarships each year to enable families in financial difficulties to play hockey. Scholarships are considered and granted on an individual case-by-case basis by the IWYHA Board. To apply, submit your request in writing along with your registration form and include information regarding the amount of assistance you need. These letters and applications must be received by the IWYHA Board no later than October 30 (see the Ice Wolves Website for more information) of the season in which you are applying for.

Registration

Ice Wolves skaters must reside in Dodgeville, Mt Horeb, and/or surrounding school districts in southwestern Wisconsin or in a school district not served by another WAHA registered hockey association. For those that wish to participate in another hockey association this requires the consent of the IWYHA and the transferring Association. Those interested in this option should contact the IWYHA Association's President.

Registration fees must be paid in full at the time of registration, either with one check for the entire registration fee dated at the time of registration or with two checks – one dated at the time of registration and the other post-dated January 1 of the current season (2011.) If paying with two checks, both must be turned in at the time of registration, but the post-dated check will not be deposited until after January 1st. Players cannot practice until registration forms have been completed and fees have been paid.

Equipment – General

It is essential for the protection and safety of the skaters that they have properly fitted equipment. If you intend to purchase equipment and are not familiar with hockey equipment, suggested sources include: Middleton Sports & Fitness, and Polar Sports (located in lobby of

the Eagles Nest). The following equipment is necessary:

1. Shoulder pads with chest protection
2. Shin guards
3. Elbow pads
4. Gloves
5. Breezers (hockey pants)
6. Hockey skates
7. Hockey stick,
8. Helmet (HECC approved)
9. Face mask
10. Hockey socks
11. Practice jersey
12. Garter belt or velcro shorts for holding up socks, athletic supporter with cup (male), pelvic protector (female).
13. Mouth guard (optional)
14. Neck guard (optional)

The IWYHA STRONGLY recommends all skaters wear neck and mouth guards. Depending on age and level of play, game jerseys and game socks may also be required. For more information see the “Equipment Rental Policy” in Appendix C.

Ice Wolves Jersey Policy

Members of the traveling teams will own both home (white) and away (black) jerseys. For more information on Jerseys, see the "Jersey Policy" in Appendix D.

Player Selection Process

1. The evaluation process for skaters and goalies will consist of age-appropriate skills testing through drills as well as hockey sense evaluation through controlled scrimmages, with an emphasis on skills testing.
2. The evaluation team will consist of at least two evaluators approved by the ACE Director.
3. Evaluation scores will be tabulated and given to the ACE Director.
4. After the evaluation phase has been completed, teams will be selected as soon as possible, usually within one to two days.
 - a. Skaters will be selected for the top-level team first, followed by all subsequent-level teams, until all players have been selected.
 - b. Skaters will be selected by the coaches based on, but not limited to, evaluation scores, coaches' recommendations, and whether it is their first or second year at that age level.
 - c. All selections will be subjected to ACE Director approval.
5. Goalie selection will be the same as that of skater selection as outlined in 4a, 4b, and 4c, with a primary goalie being placed on the top level team. The primary goalie must commit to and will play in goal at least 50% of the time for the entire season for the Squirt level and at least 75% of the time for the entire season for the Peewee level. Only players that tryout for goalie will be allowed to play that position except as provided below.
 - a. There will not be goalie evaluations for the Learn to Play Hockey or Wolf Pack levels.
 - b. Which team members play in goal when the primary goalie is not in goal will be at the coach's discretion. In these instances the primary goalie may play as a skater.
 - c. Squirts that want to be evaluated as goalies will also be evaluated as skaters. All goalies other than the primary goalie will be placed on the appropriate team as skaters as outlined in 4a, 4b, and 4c.
 - d. At the Peewee level and higher, if there are more goalies than teams all of them must also be evaluated as skaters. A primary and backup goalie will be selected for the top-level team. All other goalies will be placed on the appropriate team as skaters as outlined in 4a, 4b, and 4c.
 - e. If a goalie that was selected for a team as a skater chooses to move down to be the primary goalie for a lower level team, a skater may be moved up to fill the vacancy left at the upper level team.
6. Based on the rating of the evaluation team, players may be asked to participate in further evaluations.
7. Players are required to attend all evaluation sessions. If a player misses any of the evaluation sessions they will not be placed on a team at the end of evaluations. The

player will be evaluated and placed on a team by the coaches to the best of their abilities after the teams have been posted. Such players may be required to participate in one or more additional hours of practice or evaluations at the discretion of the coaches.

8. Any parent may request a review of their child's selection criteria by notifying the ACE Director within 72 hours of team posting.
9. Exceptions to the player selection process may include, but not be limited to the following:
 - a. Wolf Pack team will be equalized and have skaters of mixed abilities.
 - b. After teams are formed it may become necessary to move a player(s) up to a higher level team. Coaches will determine which player(s) will move up based on the criteria outlined in 4b and 4c.
 - c. For age divisions with more than two teams, only the top two teams will be selected based on the criteria outlined in 4a, 4b, and 4c. All subsequent teams will be equalized and have skaters of mixed abilities.

Double Roster Policy

The intent of the double-rostering is to assure that every team has enough players on its roster to compete. *It is the exception, not the rule.* It is **NOT** the intent of double rostering to give players from the younger age division additional playing time. Team rosters must be finalized by December 31. Players are typically double-rostered only for games and scrimmages, not practices. The double-rostered player is only invited to games or scrimmages when there is a concern that there will be too few players to play in a game or to meet the requirements to play at state tournament. (A player must play in at least 5 games with a team between December 15 and the first playoff game to be eligible to play for a team at state).

1. Criteria

Generally when a High School team has less than 13 skaters, a Bantam or Pee wee team has less than 11 skaters, or a Squirt team has less than 11 skaters, or any team with less than two goalies.

- a. Teams that do not meet these criteria may request to double-roster but must justify why it is necessary.
- b. The player's first commitment is to the age-level team.

2. Eligibility

- a. Players may only be double-roster one level up.
- b. Players will be considered for double-rostering based on criteria outlined in 4b and 4c of Player Selection Process.
- c. A player double-rostering will not displace a player from the upper level team.

3. Required approvals

- a. Parent of player wishing to double-roster.
- b. Head coach of age level team and head coach of upper age-level team.
- c. ACE Director

4. Fee

- a. A season fee of \$50 to be paid by the player wishing to double-roster regardless of the number of games played.

- b. No fee for goalies who wish to double-roster.
 - c. Fee should be made payable to IWYHA and submitted to the Registrar before the player is placed on an additional roster.
 - d. The fee will be refunded if the player is not suited up for any games.
 - e. The fee will be waived if a player double-rosters per request from the Association.
5. Process
- a. As soon as possible, a parent of the player wishing to double-roster will complete the Double-roster/Skating Up form and submit it to the ACE director.
 - b. The ACE Director will determine whether double-rostering is appropriate under the terms of this policy.
 - c. If any participating party would like to appeal the decision that is made by the ACE Director, they may make an appeal in writing to the Vice-President or ACE Director and it will be reviewed in a timely manner.
 - d. Players must be added to the gaining team's roster no later than December 31st.
 - e. Players will not participate in a game or scrimmage with the gaining team until approval is granted.

Skating at a Higher Age Classification

1. This policy is primarily for players that have demonstrated exceptional skills and by playing up they will have the opportunity to compete at a level that is appropriate for their skill level.
2. Players requesting to play up must complete the Double-roster/Skating Up form and submit it to the ACE director prior to the age level evaluations.
3. A player may be allowed to play up one USA Hockey age classification, if after participating in evaluations at the older classification, the player's total evaluation score is in the top half for that classification. If the player's total evaluation score is not in the top half for the older classification the player will be placed on a team at their age classification based on the guidelines outlined in 4a, 4b, and 4c of Player Selection Process.
4. If a player chooses to tryout at an older age classification that player will also be required to tryout at their age classification.
5. A player may only move up one age classification and has the option to double-roster or roster only on the higher age level team. If a player double-rosters then the double roster rules and fees apply.
6. A player will be allowed to tryout at the older age classifications unless the Coaches Committee determines that it will adversely affect team size at either age classification.
7. If any participating party would like to appeal the decision that is made by the Coaches Committee, they may make an appeal in writing to the Vice-President or ACE Director and it will be reviewed in a timely manner.
8. If it is determined that a player will be allowed to skate at a higher age classification then that player will be responsible for the registration dues for the higher age-level team minus any dues that may have already been paid for the lower age-level team.

Grievance Policy and Procedure

IWYHA expects Board Members, Coaches, Referees, players, and parents to conduct themselves in an ethical and responsible manner that is consistent with USA Hockey regulations and that reflects well on IWYHA. It is IWYHA's purpose to provide an effective means for all volunteers to bring problems or complaints concerning the program to the attention of the IWYHA Board without fear of recrimination. Any complaints/concerns must be reported to the IWYHA Board in writing no later than one week after an occurrence. In the event of a grievance every effort will be made to resolve complaints at a team level before coming to the Board.

Work Deposit/Work Hours and Fundraisers

A work deposit will be required from all Ice Wolves families, except those participating in the Learn to Play Hockey program. See the Work Hours/Wok Deposit Form located in Appendix E.

The Ice Wolves Youth Hockey Association conducts a variety of fundraising activities throughout the year. Typically, the net proceeds from these fundraisers go toward defraying the cost of ice fees/registration fees for the participating families. Fundraising will be required from all Ice Wolves families, except those participating in the Learn to Play Hockey program.

Code of Conduct

The Ice Wolves adopted a code of conduct in 2001 and updated it in 2010. Players and parents are asked to read and sign this at registration. Ice Wolves' coaches also sign a Coaches Code of Conduct and are expected to support the Player and Parent Code of Conduct. See the IWYHA website regarding the Code of Conduct.

Appendix D

JERSEY POLICY FOR LEARN TO PLAY & WOLF PACK MEMBERS

- Learn to Play Hockey and Wolf Pack participants will be provided with an association-owned jersey at the beginning of the season, to be returned at the end of the season.

JERSEY POLICY FOR TRAVELING TEAMS

- Skaters on traveling teams must purchase two game jerseys: one home (white) and one away (black) jersey. Name bars are available for purchase for \$15 per set.

JERSEY FEE STRUCTURE	
New set:	\$110
Used set (limited availability)	\$55

The Ice Wolves will accept used jersey sets for trade on a new set, provided the jerseys are not badly worn with holes or tears. Acceptable used jersey sets will be granted a trade-in value of \$55 to be applied to another used set (at no cost) or a new set (for \$55).

- All jersey exchanges must go through the Ice Wolves Youth Hockey Association by way of the Equipment manager. This allows the Association to track jersey numbers and avoid duplication on teams.
- In the event of number duplication on a team, the player with the most seniority in the IWYHA will have first choice of that jersey number.
- To maintain the appearance and value of their game jerseys, skaters are encouraged to wear practice jerseys, not game jerseys, for all practices. **Game jerseys are not acceptable for practices.**
- The first jersey order of the season will take place in early October. Reminders will be sent via e-mail and on the Web site. A check for jerseys will be required at the time of ordering. To account for delays, the check will be held until the jerseys have been delivered to the equipment manager. The equipment manager will make arrangements for in-person or delivery.

Work Hours consist of:

- Rink Set-up and Tear-down
- Assisting with rental equipment “Fitting Events”
- Rink cleaning (each team/program is assigned to clean the rink at certain times during the season; Learn to Play Hockey is excluded)
- Concession stand during games
- Working public skate (each team/program is assigned to work public skate sessions at certain times during the season; Learn to Play Hockey is excluded)
