Sixteen teams hit the X this week attempting to win state titles; Minnetonka and Breck earn top seeds

Welcome to the 2010 State High School Hockey Tournament!

You hold in your hands the most comprehensive guide to the teams involved in this year's tournament. It was published through the joint efforts of Breakdown Sports USA, MyFoxHockey and the Minnesota Hockey Hub, the best three sources for high school hockey and all partners with the Minnesota Hockey Coaches Association.

Class AA team capsules are located in the first half of the guide, followed by both the Class AA and Class A brackets in the guide's center and the Class A team capsules in the last half of the guide. Each team capsule includes basic information about the program, statistics of each team's leading scorers and goaltenders, full rosters, the "Road to the X," and a scouting report on each team with pictures.

Minnesota Hockey Hub editor Loren Nelson wrote half of the Class AA and Class A capsules. You'll recognize his style as the man with his finger on the pulse of Minnesota high school hockey.

There are plenty of old favorites in this year's tournament, with Edina in Class AA and Warroad in Class A teaming for numerous appearances. But there are also unfamiliar faces, programs that have been to St. Paul before, but aren't nearly as frequent guests such as Apple Valley and New Ulm.

Class A action begins the four-day celebration at the Xcel Energy Center in St. Paul. Second-seeded Mahtomedi (23-5-0) plays Alexandria (21-6-1) at 11 a.m. Wednesday, March 10, followed by No. 3 Hermantown (25-3-0) against Virginia/Mt. Iron-Buhl (18-7-3). The evening session kicks off at 6 p.m. with No. 1 and defending state champion Breck (26-2-0) taking on New Ulm (16-9-1), followed by No. 4 Warroad (24-4-0) against Rochester Lourdes (17-8-3).

The Class AA tournament opens the next morning (Thursday, March 11) at 11 a.m. with No. 2 Edina (20-6-2) against Roseau (22-5-1). At 1 p.m., No. 3 Blaine (21-4-3) faces Apple Valley (17-11-0). In the evening, top-seeded Minnetonka (25-1-2) gets its tournament underway against Lakeville North (11-15-2) at 6 p.m. The 8 p.m. game features No. 4 Hill-Murray (25-2-1) and Duluth East (19-5-4) squaring off.

The Minnesota Hockey Hub will be your complete home of the Minnesota High School Hockey tournament. We are pleased to announce that we will feature our live in-game scoring and will also offer audio play-by-play throughout the tournament.

With our team of photographers, images of the action will be updated as the games progress, and we will also be working in conjunction with our other partner, MyFoxHockey.com to post video of post game response from players and coaches.

We look forward to bringing you the most comprehensive news and information of the greatest event in high school sports from the Xcel Energy Center.



LAKEVILLE MORTH

or one night, Lakeville's civil war – emphasis on civil – shifted about 65 miles to the southeast down US Highway 52.

When third-seeded Lakeville North and top-seeded Lakeville South squared off in the Section 1AA finals last Friday night, the Rochester Civic Center was overrun by Cougars and Panthers. It may have been a ways to travel for a game, but no one wanted to miss the party afterwards. Or the reward – a trip to the Class AA state tournament.

South had to be confident after beating North twice during the regular season by a combined 9-1 score. But it was North that earned the state bid, courtesy

the state bid, courtesy of a surprising 5-0 victory.

"The kids had worked so hard during the week and in preparation for the playoffs," coach Randy Schmitz said. "There was a lot of excitement and great emotion showed by everybody."



That excitement
might have been tempered a bit
the next morning, when the
seeding was announced for the
Class AA state tournament. North
(11-15-2), the only team in the
tournament field with a losing
record, drew No. 1 Minnetonka in
the opening round Thursday night.

Schmitz was realistic about the draw, but wasn't ready to concede without a fight.

"You play under great competition throughout the year," Schmitz said, referring to the Panthers' Lake Conference slate. "We've been there before, as far as tough games against tough opponents."

That schedule is both a blessing and a curse for the Panthers.

North has certainly played plenty of tough opponents, including 10 teams ranked in the Hockey Hub's top-10 polls. That doesn't even include two games against fellow state tournament qualifier Apple Valley. The Panthers know what a statetournament quality team looks like

Unfortunately, they've only gone 1-9-2 in those 11 games, which has some observers scoffing at their sub-.500 record.

"We had some games throughout the year that we played really well in," argued Schmitz. "At the end of the season, we were able to put together four good games in a row (including a 4-4 tie with No. 9AA Jefferson in the regular season finale). The biggest difference was we were able to score some goals and get some offense."

Sophomores have paced North's attack for much of the season.
Leading scorers Nate Arentz (20-11-31) and Brady Skjei (10-18-28) are talented players, but are very

"They have great hockey skills and they played for us last year as freshmen," Schmitz said. "The mix that we have, good seniors that lead the way, and some juniors and sophomores. It's a nice balance of players."

North has rotated two goaltenders, sophomore Charlie Lindgren (6-7-2, 2.86, .890) and senior Matt Arentz (5-8-0, 3.69, .871).

dversity isn't such a bad thing. Just look at Edina. At the start of the season, the Hornets weren't expected to be particularly good. At least not by Edina's lofty standards. They were outside the top 10 in the state rankings and out of any discussions about state title contenders

Edina went 1-1-0 at Wayzata's season-opening tournament. Then came a perfect 9-0-0 December. At one point the Hornets, who beat state tournament entrants Duluth East and Blaine and eventual section finalists Elk River, Woodbury and Eden Prairie during their sizzling December, were as high as No. 2 in the state rankings.

The Hornets' followed their meteoric rise with a 2-4-2 January plunge, knocking them out of the state's top 10 once again.

But they wouldn't be down for long. A strong finish to the regular season included a stunning victory over Minnetonka (the Skippers' only loss this season). A tough 3-2 section semifinal win over Holy Angels was followed by a dominating 4-1 triumph over Bloomington Jefferson in the section final.

The Hornets are back. Back to where they were in December, back in the state tournament for the 32nd time. Edina (20-6-2) is the No. 2 seed and opens with Section 8AA champion Roseau in an 11 a.m. quarterfinal on Thursday, March 11 at the Xcel Energy Center in St. Paul.

"They really dug deep after January to come back off the mat, because they got slapped pretty hard a couple of times," Edina coach Curt Giles said. "We were

really wondering how they were going to react to it, and I've got to give them a lot of credit. They really reacted extremely well."

An amazing 13 players scored for the Hornets in their three section playoff victories, a testament to their depth. While last year's team relied heavily on the dominating line of Marshall Everson, Anders Lee and Connor Gaarder, these Hornets get consistent scoring production from all

three of their top

Steven Fogarty (20 goals, 16 assists) is the only Hornet with 20plus goals. Charlie Taft (17goals, 10 assists) and Michael Sit (12 goals, 15 assists) were second-line forwards on last year's team and rank second and third in scoring, respectively.

Max Everson, a junior being recruited by several Division I colleges, leads an underrated defensive corps that includes another standout in senior cocaptain David Jarrett. Connor Girard has been solid in goal, keeping his goals-against average under 2 (1.77) and save percentage above .900 (.915).

"I think we got off our little high horse," Taft said about the Hornets' recovery from their January Iull. "Everyone was doubting us at the beginning of the season, then we started winning and getting ranked pretty high, those losses kind of brought us down a notch. We realized we're human again."

aron Gretz can proudly say he attended one of the most famous games in Minnesota high school hockey history.

Yes, Apple Valley's junior goaltender was in the stands for the 1996 classic, "The Game That Wouldn't End." a five-overtime state tournament semfinal matchup between the Eagles and Duluth East.

Apple Valley beat the Greyhounds 4-3, halting a game that lasted 93 minutes, 12 seconds of elapsed time and ended at 1:39 a.m. It remains the longest game in state tournament history.

While Gretz was in the old St. Paul Civic Center stands (his older brother was on that Eagles team) that night and early morning, there's no telling how much of the game he actually witnessed.



"I was four years old," he said. "I do not remember it."

After shutting out Woodbury in the Section 3AA title game, Gretz now embarks on a state tournament journey he undoubtedly won't forget. Apple Valley is making its first state tournament appearance since that legendary 1996 team beat Edina to win the school's only state boys hockey title.

"I'd be lying if I said I didn't think we would be good," Apple Valley coach Jerry Hayes said after the Eagles' 3-0 section championship win over the Royals. "But we've had a lot of struggles (in the playoffs) over the years."

Hayes, in his 12th season as Apple Valley's head coach, had gone 0-5 in section championship games before this

Propelling the Eagles through that section final roadblock was the play of Gretz and two Michaelsor youngsters,



freshman Hudson Fasching and sophomore A.J. Michaelson. They each scored twice against Woodbury in the 4-0 triumph.

Fasching, a star at the Bantam level last season, led the Eagles with 40 points (23 goals, 17 assists) and has been playing on a line with Michaelson, who has a teambest five goals and four assists in three playoff games, since they were Pee Wees.

Apple Valley has yet another potent forward unit featuring Chris Fischer (11 goals, 16 assists) and Kris Goodman (10 goals, 10 assists).

surgical 5-1 dismantling of arch rival White Bear Lake in the Section 4AA final gave Hill-Murray plenty of lead time in putting together its state tournament preparations.

Which isn't to say the Pioneers were looking past the Bears while still playing them, but they needed only a few minutes – just enough time to collect their sticks and gloves and leave the State Fairgrounds Coliseum ice surface – to switch into state tournament mode.

"Now it's time to move on," Hill-Murray coach Bill Lechner said. "This team had very high goals. Win the conference, this was the sectional one, and obviously everybody knows what we all want with the third goal."

Hill-Murray, which won the state Class AA title in 2009, is making its fifth straight state tournament appearance. Other than Minnetonka, no team enters the Class AA portion of the state tournament with fewer losses than the Pioneers (25-2-1).

Hill-Murray, ranked fourth in the Hockey Hub's final state Class AA poll, received a No. 4 seed behind Minnetonka, Edina and Blaine, respectively. The Pioneers' two losses came against Blaine during the Schwan Cup and Class A powerhouse St. Thomas Academy late in the season.

After beating White Bear Lake and before the state tournament seeds were announced, Lechner said he wasn't too concerned where the Pioneers were slotted.

"Not really, the only thing is that whoever gets the (No. 2) spot plays at 11 o'clock in the morning," he said. "I'm not in love with that.

"We've done well and we've struggled through the years, it's not like one avenue has been the right way. We've been

t this time of the year, with only the strongest of teams having survived the sectional round of playoffs, it's not uncommon for statetournament bound coaches to broach the subject of chemistry.

Typically, they'll talk about how close they have become to their players, and how their players don't so much form a team as they do an extended family.

Listen closely to Blaine's Dave Aus, though, and you'll realize these Bengals really do have a special relationship with their coach.

"It's going to be really sad when they are done," Aus said about the seniors on his roster.

Bjugstad, a 6-foot-4 Mr. Hockey candidate projected to be a firstround NHL draft pick this summer, has taken accelerated classes so he can graduate a year early and play for Minnesota. He had six goals

and three assists in three sectional playoff games, giving him a team-best 69 points this season.

ow good is Minnetonka?
The Skippers won their opening five games this season by a combined score of 39-1.

They twice beat St. Thomas Academy, the state's No. 1-ranked Class A team for most of the season, by identical 5-2 margins.

They routed Duluth East 6-2 and Edina 7-1 in the regular season, and both the Greyhounds and Hornets join the Skippers in this year's Class AA field.

They won their first 19 games of the season and didn't suffer their only loss (to Edina) until Feb 11.

Before the season, three of their defensemen (Troy Hesketh, Wisconsin; Justin Holl, Minnesota: and

Andrew Prochno, St. Cloud State) were committed to WCHA schools, as was forward Max Gardiner (Minnesota).

Hesketh already has been drafted, by the Edmonton Oilers, and it's likely Holl and Gardiner also will be selected high in the NHL draft this summer.

Had enough? Wait, there's more.

The latest Skippers' feat in which to marvel at was their 7-

marvel at was their 7-2 dismantling of defending state Class AA champion Eden Prairie in the Section 6AA final. Minnetonka scored four times in the final period to turn what was a tight game (the Skippers led 3-2 after two periods) into a rout.

"They kind of smelled blood there, a little bit," Minnetonka coach Brian Urick said about the Skippers' third-period eruption. "Just when they knew they got the lead, I think their spirits just went up. As soon as we could get that lead I knew our guys would get sparked and get those feet moving."

As it turns out, Minnetonka's only loss, a 5-4 overtime setback to Edina on Feb. 11, might have been the best thing that could have happened to the Skippers. They were stunned by the Hornets after taking a 4-0 lead to the locker room after the first period.



osh Spaniol knew the numbers weren't good. But he worked the calculation anyway.

Add all that up, and you have a team not only in the state Class A tournament but one that has a chance to engineer an upset or two.

"I ran into a few our kids today," Spaniol said on Sunday. "They are still buzzing right now. Our program is very excited to get a taste of what we had last year." Last season the Eagles gave eventual state champion Breck its toughest game of the state tournament before losing in the quarterfinals. Lourdes went on to win the consolation championship.

This year Lourdes opens with a quarterfinal game against No. 4 seed Warroad at 8 p.m. on Wednesday, March 10, at the Xcel Energy Center in St. Paul.

The Eagles did not play the Warriors during the regular season, one of the few high-powered Class A programs not on Lourdes' schedule.

"I don't know much about them," Spaniol said. "But I know they will be like we are in that they will be physical. And that they like to play defensive hockey, too."

The Eagles' regular season schedule included the top two ranked Class A teams in the state for most of the season, St. Thomas Academy and Breck. Lourdes lost to Breck 2-1 and St. Thomas Academy 5-3 in a game that was closer than the score indicated.

"We played two of the top teams in the state very tough," Spaniol said. "That's what gave our players the opportunity to believe in themselves and their abilities."

Funk, one of the state's best freshmen, has a team-high 15 goals to go with 14 assists. Another Lourdes freshman, Jason Samuelson, has 13 goals and 15 assists to tie for second on the team in scoring.

hen John Russell gets his well-padded arms and legs moving, he doesn't so much resemble a goaltender as he does a windmill on blustery day.

Pucks so rarely get through Russell's menagerie of perfectly angled body parts that Breck coach Les Larson can't recall the senior goaltender's last shaky outing.

"I think we are a deeper team and a better team," Larson said about his top-seeded Mustangs, who finished the season ranked No. 1 in the Hockey Hub's final Class A poll. "Statistically, we are a

honestly don't think we have had our best game yet. I'm hoping that is coming."

Russell allowed one goal in three playoff games and has a 1.43 goals-against average and .934 save percentage in 22 games overall. As great as those numbers are, check out Breck's offensive totals. The Mustangs were the state's highest scoring team in the regular season, averaging 7.40 goals per game. They beat their three sectional tournament opponents (St. Louis Park, Orono and Blake) by a combined



rik Setterholm remembers the last time New Ulm qualified for the state tournament. It's a fond memory, but not a long one. The Eagles advanced in the first season of the Tier II experiment in 1992, but were shut out by Cambridge-Isanti in the opening round.

"We were so in awe, the game was over before it started," admitted Setterholm.

Minneapolis Roosevelt dispatched the Eagles in the consolation semifinals the next morning. Few thought it would be 18 years before New Ulm returned to state, nor that Setterholm would be behind the bench for the return trip.

Yet nearly two decades later, he's running the show in the Southern Minnesota community. And the Eagles finally made it back to St. Paul, beating Litchfield/Dassel-Cokato, 5-2, in the Section 3A finals last Friday night at Gustavus.

"It was a big relief for me, the team and the whole hockey community," Setterholm said. "It was amazing, but it still hasn't hit me. It was kind of a blur. The place was unreal how loud it was in there."

Days later, Setterholm has the town still buzzing about the state trip.

"The whole town, you can't go and buy gas without five or six people telling you congratulations, people you don't even know," smiled Setterholm.

New Ulm has come close to a return trip to the X in recent years, but fell just shy each time. In each of the past three years, they've

advanced to the section finals as the favorite, but lost in heartbreaking fashion. Perhaps it makes this year's trip even sweeter.

"The last couple of years, things didn't go right in that final game for us," shrugged Setterholm. "We didn't get any bounces and things like that. Hit crossbars and pipes that would have changed the game. But we made the most of our opportunities Friday night against


Litchfield."

Ironically, this season New Ulm was the underdog in the section tournament, coming in as a No. 3 seed after graduating All-State sniper Kyle Reinarts. Junior goaltender Blake Burgau (16-9-1, 2.67, .899) also has been solid, playing every minute of every game in nets. He's a focused competitor who will be challenged by the Eagles' tough draw, which is defending state champion and No. 1 seed Breck.

Setterholm admitted that almost no one expects them to win the game. But he's hoping for a longer state tournament experience the second time around.

"The biggest thing for our boys is to show up and play hard and leave it all on the ice. Whatever the outcome is, it is," Setterholm said. "Nobody can take away the fact that we're one of the last 16 teams still playing at this time of the year."

or two straight years now, Breck coach Les Larson and his assistant coach, son Peter, have gone to scout Mahtomedi and St. Thomas Academy in the Section 4A championship.

For two straight years, the ritual has been the same.

"My son takes notes on Mahtomedi and I take notes on St. Thomas Academy," Larson said. "And, again, at the end of the game I roll up my notes and throw them away."

Any doubts about the Zephyrs' ability to contend for a state title should be fully laid to rest. Counting last year's sectional final, Mahtomedi has defeated St. Thomas

Academy, ranked No. 1 in Class A for most of the season, in three of their last four meetings.

How do they keep doing it? Well, it starts with Brad Wohlers. The epitome of a biggame goaltender, Wohlers made 44 saves against a Cadets team loaded with future Division I forwards. Wohlers' statistics are good (2.61 goals-against average, .908 save percentage) not great, but it would be hard to find a goaltender who plays better in high-pressure situations.

Beyond Wohlers, Mahtomedi merely has elite defenseman Ben Marshall. A junior who committed to play at Minnesota as a sophomore, Marshall has 19 goals, 34 assists and a burst that makes him a threat to go end-to-end at any moment.

Up front, few one-two offensive punches are more effective than

the Zephyrs' Brandon Zurn (33 goals, 39 assists) and Charlie Adams (33 goals, 33 assists).

Add all that up and Mahtomedi has as good a stable of high-end talent as any Class A team in the tournament. The No. 2-seeded Zephyrs (23-5-0) will, however, have to find a way to combat No. 1 seed Breck's depth should the teams meet. The Mustangs beat the Zephyrs twice during the

he way Bruce Plante sees it, the hard part is over. For the Hermantown coach, surviving a section final everyone expects your team to win, against a goalie playing so out of his mind the puck might just as well be a beach ball, that's a nerve-fraying experience.

The state tournament?

"The key is to stay relaxed, stay calm, not get too much above yourself," said Plante, in his 20th season as the Hawks' head coach. "Just play your game, the normal game that you've had all year.

"Actually, the section final game is a lot harder. That is a pressure cooker. You are so close to (going to state), you have all these little dreams."

Hermantown typically dreams big when it comes to the state tournament. The Hawks won the Class A title in 2007 and will be making their seventh appearance since 1994. They finished second in 1998, third in 2001 and third in 2006.

To reach the Xcel Energy Center in St. Paul this season, the Hawks needed to get past Duluth Marshall and the Hunters' standout freshman goaltender, Zach Thompson. Hermantown outshot Denfeld 48-20 but required a goal from Kevin Danielson with about 7 minutes remaining to get the 3-2 win.

"You always worry about that as a coach that, you will run into one of those hot goaltenders," Plante said, referencing his powerhouse 2004 team that was upended by Hibbing in a section championship game. "It is scary."

Most frightening for Hermantown's opposition is the sight of big senior forward Adam Krause bearing down with the puck. Hermantown's Mr. Hockey finalist and Minnesota-Duluth recruit has team highs of 38 goals and 28 assists.

While no other Hawks player has more than 18 goals, Plante said depth is probably his team's biggest strength.

"All three of our lines scored against Denfeld," Plante said, pointing out the Hawks have 13 seniors on their roster. "Having that many seniors, I think we wore Denfeld down, actually."



with another northern power, Virginia/Mountain Iron-Buhl in a 1 p.m. quarterfinal game on Wednesday, March 10, at the Xcel Energy Center in St. Paul.

"That was probably the last matchup I wanted," Plante said about a Blue Devils team Hermantown beat 4-2 on Dec. 22. "Just because it would be nice to see the northern teams play each other a little farther down the road."

A lexandria coach Scott Woods had a message for his team. "It's our time."

With his Cardinals leading Sartell-St. Stephen by a single goal during the second intermission of the Section 6A finals last week, Woods looked his players in the eyes and implored them to finish what they'd started months earlier.

"We had a discussion, saying that nobody was taking this away from us this year," Woods said. "I had a sense that this group wasn't going to let it happen. It was our turn to go down there (St. Paul)."

The Cardinals responded, as Ashton Gronolz and Thomas Williams scored in the first five minutes to put the game out of reach – sending Alexandria back to state after some heartbreaking losses in past playoffs.

The Cardinals will have to continue to play as they did in winning the section title, getting good goaltending from sophomore Erich Murphy (16-3-1, 1.90, .914) and a solid team defensive effort in front of him."

Murphy has been a godsend for the Cardinals, who lost All-Stater Matt Hemingway to graduation. He started off on a steep learning curve, but has been very good the past few weeks.

"It took him some time," admitted Woods. "Those were huge shoes to fill and he's been one of our biggest surprises. It was an adjustment with the speed of game and harder shots. Once we were two weeks into the season, he had to keep battling for that spot and that's what has made him hetter"

Offensively, watch for senior Thomas Williams (37-24-61), who has played on the

"We weren't even on the bus yet," laughed Hendrickson, who is enjoying his second straight trip to the state tournament. It's a good news, bad news situation. For all the congratulations also come the comments when things don't go as well. Last year, those same text message playfully chided Hendrickson after the Blue Devils lost both games at state.

Virginia is hoping for a better result to this year's state tournament experience. This year's juniors were fresh-faced sophomores last year when the Blue Devils were two-and-done. The pain from those losses was tough to let go.

Myhre (10-3-3, 1.91, .922) has been a surprise this year, as he has improved into a good varsity goaltender through plenty of hard work.

What hasn't been a surprise is the offensive firepower of the Blue Devils, led by SCSU-bound junior Garrett Hendrickson (32-44-76

"Last year, their goaltender won the state title for them," Warroad coach Albert Hasbargen said. "I thought our scoring chances were more than theirs in that championship game, but that young man played an excellent game."

While Breck seemed an easy pick to get back to state, returning 20 letter winners, Warroad's path was much less certain. The Warriors graduated many top players, including goaltender Jason Goldsmith, leaving plenty of holes.

But the fire from that loss still burned in the remaining Warriors, including All-Staters Brock Nelson (47-38-85), Brett Hebel (26-44-70) and defenseman Carson Gray (7-33-40).

"We were pretty hungry for it,

coming off a loss last year," Hebel said. "We just want to come home with some gold."

The Warriors took the first step, edging rival Thief River Falls in the Section 8A championship game last Thursday night. But that only got them to St. Paul.

"Your next job is to win the state title and that's what we go down there for," Hasbargen said.

Warroad's path may have gotten a bit smoother in recent weeks, as well, with the emergence of sophomore goaltender Andy Foster (8-1-0, 1.95, .901).

Foster wasn't expected to see much varsity time this winter, with Shawn Storey carrying the load in his senior season. But when Storey hurt his knee in a Jan. 26 game against Crookston, Foster was thrown in the fire. All he's done since is win 10 of his 11 starts while allowing more than three goals just once. In the past four games, Foster has given up just three goals.

"He's done everything that we've asked of him," Hasbargen said.

As the Warriors know, it's important to have a hot goaltender at this time of the season. They remember peppering Russell with shot after shot last March -- to no avail.

They may just get another
