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Plymouth Ice Center - Did You Know?

The Plymouth Ice Center is one of the busiest ice facilities in Minnesota. An estimated 300,000 people visit the facility each year.

The ice arena (with two sheets of ice) and the LifeTime Fitness facility were constructed in 1996 as a public-private partnership that included the City of Plymouth, Wayzata School District, and LifeTime Fitness. This

was the first partnership of its kind in the United States, and the model has since been replicated by dozens of cities. Plymouth Park and Recreation Director Eric Blank said, "We built this project 14 years ago, and I still receive calls from cities looking to establish the same type of successful partnership. We were able to provide more amenities of ice and swimming pools by joining our resources, and we focus operations on what we each do best." The City operates the ice arena. LifeTime operates the pools as part of their club.

In 2004, the facility was expanded to include a third sheet of ice. A new partner, Providence Academy stepped up to help fund the expansion. The Wayzata Youth Hockey Association contributed toward the original project and the third sheet of ice. For its role in contributing funds toward the ice center, WYHA receives a high priority in ice scheduling and pays the lowest hourly rate for ice rental. WYHA is the biggest user of the facility, using nearly 3,000 hours of ice each year. The facility also annually hosts about 45 high school hockey games (Wayzata, Armstrong, and Providence) with an average attendance of 265 per game.

The Plymouth Ice Center has a value of \$14.3 million and operates on an annual budget of \$1.4 million. The facility is open nearly every day of the year from 6 a.m. to 11:30 p.m., and operates with 71 employees, only 4 of whom are full-time. Most employees are part-time or seasonal workers.

The Ice Center is an "energy hog", and energy costs are about \$1,100 each day. The facility's electrical bill was \$245,000 last year while the gas bill was \$145,000. Ice Arena Manager Bill Abel commented, "We are always looking for ways to manage our energy bills. We have implemented many energy-saving projects in recent years including replacement lighting, transient voltage surge suppressors, intelligent motor controllers (IMC), vending misers, desiccant dehumidification, and a propane back-up system. The installation of IMC resulted in a 15% electric energy savings. The propane back-up resulted in a 15% discount on the facility's gas bill.

Abel shared the PIC mission statement: "The Plymouth Ice Center is dedicated to creating and maintaining a fun, family-oriented atmosphere. Our staff is committed to providing excellent customer service, value, and program opportunities to everyone." He said, "We are frequently told by visitors that the Plymouth Ice Center is the cleanest ice arena in the state. Our employees are very proud of that reputation and work hard to maintain it."

Bake Your Own Energy with Chris Freytag

1/2 cup Natural Peanut Butter
2 Tbs Butter
1 tsp Vanilla

I recently sat with Health and Fitness Trainer Chris Freytag at a hockey game. It had been a long tournament weekend, and our team was playing their fifth game in three days. Entering the third period, Chris yelled, "Energy, boys, energy!" While she was indeed urging the team on, she does more than cheer when it comes to the team's energy. Chris bakes them energy bars!

Chris explained, "Food companies market energy bars to athletes, but many of the energy bars on the market are very high in added sugar, full of fats, chemicals, and most noticeably - an expensive price tag." Her energy bars are a great pre-game snack. Chris stated, "These bars are loaded with healthy carbs, proteins and fat - they can keep you fueled for your sporting events and are packed with nutritional value! Cut them up, wrap in wax paper individually and stick them in your freezer - your kids can grab and go!"

The only caution is that the players love these bars and they go fast. Chris arrived at a recent tournament with five 9"x13" pans of energy bars, and the team finished them all. Also, be aware of any nut allergies on your team.

PEANUT BUTTER AND CHOCOLATE ENERGY BARS

-From Chris Freytag's kitchen
1 1/2 cups Old Fashioned Oats
2 1/2 cups Puffed Wheat Cereal
1/2 cup Almond Slivers, lightly chopped
1/4 cup Ground Flax Seeds
1/2 cup Sunflower Seeds
1/2 cup Chopped Walnuts
1/2 cup Chocolate Chips
1/4 tsp Salt
3/4 cup Light Agave Nectar*
3/4 cup Brown Sugar

1. Combine oats, almonds, puffed cereal, flax seeds, sunflower seeds, walnuts, and chocolate chips in a large bowl.

2. In a small saucepan, combine butter, peanut butter, brown sugar, salt, and agave nectar. Bring mixture to a slight boil. Remove from heat and stir in vanilla.

3. Pour mixture quickly over the dry ingredients. Stir to combine... chocolate chips will melt.

4. With wet fingers, press mixture VERY FIRMLY into a 9x13 pan lined with wax paper. Let harden. (I put them in the freezer for 15 minutes.) Cut into approx 24 pieces. If you want them thicker, make 1 and 1/2 of the recipe.

5. Store in the freezer - best when thawed for a few minutes.

*You can use honey but I prefer Agave Nectar which has a low glycemic index; is less sticky than honey; and has all the useful properties of real sugars when baking. Its lower glycemic index helps protect against health risks associated with higher glycemic sweeteners. Agave nectar unlike some artificial sweetener can brown well, bake well and acts as a softener and a preservative.
