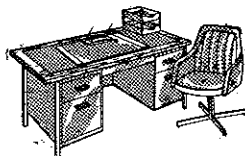

In the 1971 Indoor, which the Kickers ran, the Chicago Schwaben emerged victorious with Getzinger as top scorer of the entire tournament. The coupons are good for any date and any seat in the house. Prices are as follows: (With coupons)

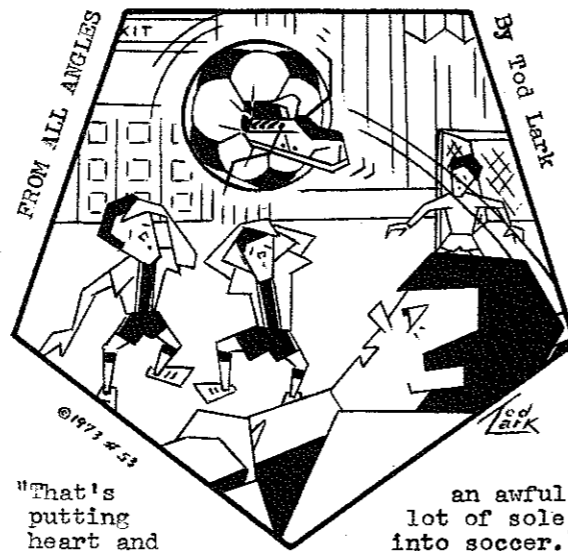

Mike Sceray scored two goals within 61 seconds to power St. Louis University to its ninth NCAA soccer championship with a 4-2 victory over UCLA Dec. 29 in the Orange Bowl.

St. Louis had downed defending champion Howard Univ. 2-1 in overtime; and UCLA nipped Cornell 1-0 in the semi-finals two days earlier.

Clay Berling, publisher of Soccer America Magazine, hit the nail on the head in a recent editorial...our philosophy put quite eloquently:

"Although soccer in other countries has developed out of clubs, and not primarily or even peripherally through the school, it appears unmistakable that USA soccer its big breakthrough within the school and college system.

"Those who are deeply involved in youth soccer may sometimes resent this fact, and see the schools as rivals for their boys... Realistically this emerging effort is the greatest opportunity we have in the promotion of the game. Rather than being concerned about the impact of the schools on youth leagues, we should welcome it, and do everything possible to accommodate it.

"Soccer has its share of fans now, but they are mostly former players. For a sport to succeed, it must have its share of those who did NOT play, were unathletic or participated in the pep of the game (i.e. cheerleaders, Pom Pom girls, band members). This kind of participation occurs in only one place in American society. CONT'D P. 6

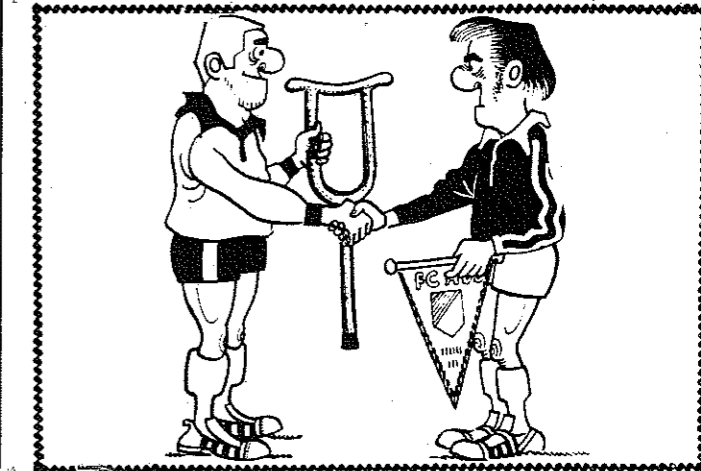
