#### **BRONZE MEDAL BITES**

The U.S. will finish in the top four of the world championship for the third time in the last four years, a feat that has been accomplished just once before in the country's history (1931-34) ... Team USA looks for its third medal in the last four years. The U.S. has won four medals in the last 50 years (all bronze) ... Team USA returned to its hotel just after midnight last night and had a team meal before retiring for the evening. Today's faceoff will come some 17 hours after last night's game against Canada finished ... The U.S. finds itself in the exact situation it did last year as it played the second semifinal and after a loss had to get ready for the bronze medal game against the host country ... Team USA netminder Thatcher Demko's girlfriend, Lexie Shaw, has been here at the world championship the past week. Shaw is a goaltender for the University of North Dakota women's ice hockey team ... Brock Nelson, Dylan Larkin, Pat Maroon, Auston Matthews, Chris Wideman and **Nick Foligno** were the six players on the ice trying to net the equalizer in the final minute of last night's game against Canada with netminder Keith Kinkaid pulled ... Team USA's best finish previously in a world championship held in Russia was fifth place. It will eclipse that this year ... The U.S. enters play today having been in four straight one-goal games (five total in the tournament) ... Chris Wideman is tied for the tournament lead in points among defensemen (2-4--6), while **Connor Murphy** is tied for second (2-3--5) ... Auston Matthews is tied for third in the tournament in goals with six, while Dylan Larkin is tied for fifth in the world championship in assists with seven ... Ben Smith was inducted into the IIHF Hall of Fame here earlier today ... Jake McCabe, Auston Matthews and Connor Murphy were named Team USA's best three players of the tournament following last night's game.

#### TODAY'S GAME

The U.S. Men's National Team will face Russia today at 4:15 p.m. with a chance for its second straight medal and third in four years in the world championship in today's bronze medal game of the 2016 IIHF Men's World Championship at the Ice Palace in Moscow. Today's contest is being live streamed in the U.S. via NBC Sports Live Extra. There is no television coverage.

#### LINEUP TODAY

**Keith Kinkaid** will get his fourth straight start in goal today for the U.S. He is 2-3 in the world championship with a 2.71 goals against average and .892 save percentage. Forward **Vinnie Hinostroza** and goaltender **Thatcher Demko** will not dress today. **Kyle Connor** returns to the U.S. lineup after not having played the past two games.

#### · ALL-TIME vs. RUSSIA

The U.S. and Russia meet for the 15th time in the world championship here today. The teams have met once previously in the bronze medal game of the world championship, that a 4-3 U.S. victory on May 4, 1996. Russia leads the series by a 7-0-1-5-1 (W-OTW-OTL-L-T) margin. (note: The U.S. is 0-28-0 against the Soviet Union all-time in the world championship).



# 2015 Men's World Championship A Look Back

The 2015 U.S. Men's National Team finished third among 16 teams at the IIHF Men's World Championship in Ostrava and Prague, Czech Republic. Team USA (7-1-0-2, W-OTW-OTL-L) lost to Russia in the semifinals but went on to beat host Czech Republic in the bronze medal game. It was Team USA's second bronze medal in the past three years. Previously the U.S. hadn't medaled in two of three years in more than 50 years. Forward **Brock Nelson** led all U.S. players with 10 points (6-4), while forward **Trevor Lewis** contributed 9 points (3-6).



• THE U.S. IN BRONZE MEDAL GAMES -- The U.S. is 4-3 in seven previous bronze-medal games in the IIHF Men's World Championship. 

**Notes:** Connor Hellebuyck stopped all 39 Czech Republic shots on goal to help the U.S. win its second bronze medal in three years at the men's world championship. It was a gutsy effort by a young U.S. team (average age 24.3) after losing a hard fought semifinal game to Russia just 16 hours earlier. Nick Bonino, who had a goal and an assist, was named Team USA's Player of the Game. The best three U.S. players of the tournament were also named and included Hellebuyck, Trevor Lewis and Seth Jones. Hellebucyk was named the goaltender on the media all-star team, but despite leading the tournament in wins, goals against average and save percentage, was remarkably not named the top goaltender by the directorate.



#### · BEN SMITH INDUCTED INTO IIHF HALL OF FAME

Ben Smith, who was the head coach of three U.S. Olympic Women's Ice Hockey Teams, including the 1998 squad that won the first-ever gold medal awarded in women's hockey in the Olympic Winter Games, was inducted into the IIHF Hall of Fame here earlier today. Smith, who continues to be widely involved in player evaluation for USA Hockey, was also an assistant coach for the 1988 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team. He was the first full-time women's national team coach ever hired by USA Hockey back in 1996, a position he held for 10 years. Smith's wife, Julie, is with him here in Moscow for the celebration.

#### MANAGEMENT TEAM

The 2016 U.S. Men's National Team is under the direction of the U.S. Men's National Team Advisory Group, including NHL general managers **Stan Bowman** (Chicago), **Dean Lombardi** (Los Angeles), **David Poile** (Nashville), and **Ray Shero** (New Jersey). Also involved is **Dale Tallon**, president of hockey operations for the Florida Panthers and **Don Waddell**, president of Gale Force Sports & Entertainment. The group is led by **Jim Johannson**, USA Hockey's assistant executive director of hockey operations. **Chris Drury**, director of player development for the New York Rangers, is also part of the management group for the 2016 U.S. Men's National Team.

#### USA HOCKEY'S NTDP ROOTS

Fourteen members of the 2016 U.S. Men's National Team were members of USA Hockey's National Team Development Program. The NTDP is an elite development program created by USA Hockey in 1996 currently housed in the Detroit suburb of Plymouth, Michigan.

#### • TEAM LEADERSHIP GROUP

Matt Hendricks is the captain of the 2016 U.S. Men's National Team. He played on his first U.S. Men's National Team a year ago and as captain helped lead Team USA to the bronze medal. Hendricks was the oldest member of the U.S. Men's National Team a year ago and holds that same distinction this year at age 34. The next oldest on the team is Nick Foligno (28). Hendricks has served as an alternate captain throughout his professional career, including at Edmonton the last three seasons. He was team captain of his college team, St. Cloud State University, in 2003-04. Nick Foligno and Connor Murphy are the team's alternate captains. Foligno has played for Team USA in two previous IIHF Men's World Championships (2009, 2010), while Murphy is also a two-time veteran of the U.S. Men's National Team (2014, 2015-bronze) and helped Team USA win gold medals in both the 2013 IIHF World Junior Championship and 2011 IIHF U18 Men's World Championship. Murphy has played 37 games for Team USA, the second most of any player on the roster. Jordan Schroeder leads the way with 41 games played.

#### TEAM USA COACHING STAFF

John Hynes is serving as head coach of the U.S. Men's National Team for the first time. Hynes, the head coach of the New Jersey Devils, spent six seasons (2003-09) as a head coach at USA Hockey's National Team Development Program, and also served as an assistant coach of the gold medal 2004 U.S. National Junior Team. He was recently named an assistant coach for the U.S. team that will compete in the 2016 World Cup of Hockey. Todd Richards and David Quinn are serving as assistant coaches. Richards was head coach of last year's bronze medal-winning U.S. Men's National Team.

Team USA's leading goal scorer and point getter heading into tonight's game is 18-year-old **Auston Matthews** with five goals and eight total points. **Dylan Larkin**, age 19, is second in points with 2-5--7. #### U.S. Success in 2016

Team USA has medaled at every International Ice Hockey Federation event of the 2016 campaign so far, including two gold medals and two bronze medals. Both women's teams — the U.S. Women's National Team and U.S. Women's National Under-18 Team — took home gold at their respective world championships. The U.S. National Junior Team earned bronze at the 2016 World Junior Championship in Helsinki, Finland. And most recently, the U.S. Men's National Under-18 Team took home bronze at the IIHF U18 Men's World Championship, marking Team USA's 13th consecutive medal at the event.



**TIBITS FROM PREVIOUS GAME NOTES** Team USA flew from NYC to Helsinki Saturday, April 30, with an early Sunday arrival. The team had a training camp in Helsinki Sunday-Tuesday and played an exhibition game against Finland Tuesday evening (May 3). Auston Matthews left the U.S. with his parents on Friday, April 29, and arrived Saturday in Helsinki in time to be hooked up live via satellite to the NHL Draft Lotterv Selection Show. The U.S. arrived in St. Petersburg via train Wednesday afternoon, May 4, from Helsinki ... Dale Tallon was with Team USA from its time in Helsinki through May 9. Tallon is part of the U.S. Men's National Team Advisory Group which is responsible for selecting players and staff for the U.S. Men's National Team ... Chris Drury is part of the U.S. management group for this year's men's national team and was with the team through May 7 ... Auston Matthews was flanked by captain Matt Hendricks (left) and Jordan Schroeder (right) in Team USA's lockerroom in St. Petersburg ... The average age of Team USA is 23.0 years old (see the average age of Team USA since 2004 in these notes) ... Goaltender Thatcher Demko, a student at Boston College, took a final exam in sociology on Thursday, May 5, in St. Petersburg ... Seven players on the U.S. roster played NCAA Division I hockey in 2015-16 (Demko, Santini, Compher, Conner, Fasching, Motte, Wood) ... Forward Pat Maroon is just the third player ever with the last name of a color on a U.S. Men's National Team. John Blue and a host of Browns, including Charlie (yes, Charlie Brown), Doug, Dustin, Greg, J.T., Mike and Peter are the others ... The U.S. gave up five goals in its loss to Canada (May 6). Team USA hadn't given up that many goals in an opening game of the IIHF Men's World Championship since 2003 when it dropped a 5-2 decision to Denmark ... Stan Wong is serving as an athletic trainer for a U.S. team for the 37th time. This year marks his 10th straight men's world championship. He has also served as a trainer for three Olympic teams, 14 national junior squads, nine Deutschland Cup teams and for Team USA at one Youth Olympic Games. Wong was inducted into the Professional Hockey Athletic Trainers Hall of Fame in June 2015 ... Dr. Yani Zinis, who is a team physician for the Colorado Avalanche, is Team USA's team physician. Zinis' nephew, Christos, played hockey as a 15-year-old in Scottsdale, Arizona, with **Auston Matthews** ... U.S. Head Coach John Hynes and assistant coach David Quinn spent one season together (2003-04) as head coaches at USA Hockey's National Team Development Program ... The U.S. Men's National Team enjoyed dinner at Korushka along the Neva River in St. Petersburg Sunday night, May 8. Smelt was among the fare served. Following dinner, the players returned to the hotel, while many members of the staff enjoyed a boat cruise through the canal arranged by its team host Misha Manchik. The staff learned that each time you pass under a bridge, you're supposed to yell and/or celebrate with a toast. By doing so, the legend is that your wishes

will come true. A St. Petersburg, Russia, resident, Manchik has previously served as the massage therapist for multiple U.S. national teams and also for the 2002 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team ... USA Hockey is the host federation for the 2017 IIHF Women's World Championship. The event will be staged the first week of April in Plymouth, Michigan, at USA Hockey Arena ... USA Hockey will also host the 2018 IIHF World Junior Championship Dec. 26-Jan. 5 in Buffalo, New York. In a unique twist, the U.S. is expected to faceoff against Canada in preliminary round play outdoors at Ralph Wilson Stadium ... Forwards Jordan Schroeder and defenseman Brady Skjei both took final exams Sunday, May 8, in pursuit of degrees at the University of Minnesota ... Jim Johannson, who is with Team USA and serving in a management capacity for Team USA, played for the 1983 U.S. National Junior Team at the Yubileiny Sports Palace in the IIHF World Junior Championship. That year, the city was called Leningrad before it was returned to the name St. Petersburg in 1991. The U.S. finished fifth in the tournament, the seventh edition of the World Juniors. Johannson had two goals and an assist in seven games. A two-time U.S. Olympian, Johannson works full time for USA Hockey as assistant executive director for hockey operations ... Team USA, at 23, has the youngest average age of the 16 teams in the world championship. Canada is the next voungest at 24, followed by Denmark, Hungary and Slovakia at 26; Czech Republic, Latvia, Norway, Russia, Sweden, Switzerland, Belarus, Finland and Germany at 27; France at 28 and Kazakhstan at 29 ... U.S. Head Coach John Hynes coached France captain Laurent Meunier and alternate captain Yorick Treille in 2000-01 when the two played NCAA Division I hockey for UMass-Lowell and Hynes was an assistant coach there ... Ray Shero, a member of the U.S. Men's National Team Advisory Group, arrived May 11 and will be here for the duration of the tournament. Shero is the general manager of the NHL's New Jersey Devils ... Paul Holmgren, president of the NHL's Philadelphia Flyers and the assistant GM of the 2016 U.S. World Cup team, arrived May 11 and was here for three days ... Most guests of the players and staff of Team USA arrived May 12 ... Team USA alternate captain Nick Foligno didn't know any of his U.S. teammates prior to this tournament ... The U.S. has participated in the two previous world championships hosted in Russia. In 2007, Team USA went 4-0-1-2 and finished fifth in Moscow & Mythschi, while in 2002 in St. Petersburg, the U.S. was also fifth with a record of 4-1-2. Team USA also participated in two world championships in the former USSR (1986, 5th, 4-6-0; 1979, 7th, 2-2-3), Additionally, the U.S. was in the B Pool when the top level world championship was held in the USSR in 1973 and the U.S. did not compete in the 1957 world championship that was held in the USSR ... The U.S. has hosted just one men's world championship outside the Olympic Winter Games, that in 1962 when the event was staged in Colorado

Springs and Denver, Colorado (Sweden-gold, Canada-silver, USA-bronze). Colorado Springs is the current home of USA Hockey, the governing body for ice hockey in the U.S. ... Some of the friends and family of Team USA took a tour of Peterhof on May 13 ... Team USA equipment manager Scott Aldrich's brother Mike is the head equipment manager for the NHL's San Jose Sharks. The Sharks are playing in the Western Conference Finals against the St. Louis Blues ... U.S. Head Coach John Hynes works full-time as head coach of the NHL's New Jersey Devils. Hynes hired Geoff Ward, assistant coach for Team Germany, last summer to be an assistant coach in New Jersey. The two did not previously know each other ... The eight shots on goal allowed by Team USA in its 5-1 win over Hungary on May 13 marked a new U.S. tournament record for fewest shots on goal allowed in a game ... Forward Hudson Fasching will visit Amsterdam and Paris with his girlfriend and parents following the world championship ... Forward Brock Nelson will be married on July 30 in Minneapolis .... Some of the players, staff and quests of Team USA visited the Hermitage Museum on May 14 ... Bob Webster is in his fifth decade of service to U.S. national teams. This year marks his 12th straight as team leader for the U.S. Men's National Team. Webster has also served as Team USA's equipment manager for 15 previous world championships (1979, 82, 86, 87, 89-96, 2002-04) ... Brock Nelson's uncle Dave Christian was a member of the 1980 "Miracle On Ice" U.S. Olympic Hockey Team. In addition, his grandfather, Bill Christian and great uncle, Roger Christian, were both on the 1960 gold-medal-winning U.S. Olympic Team and another great uncle, Gordon Christian, played for the U.S. at the 1956 Olympic Winter Games where the team won the silver medal. Brock's middle name is ... you guessed it - Christian ... Defenseman David Warsofsky is the only player on Team USA with a May birthday. Warsofsky will turn 26 on May 30 ... Ron De-Gregorio, co-chair of the board of USA Hockey, was elected to the IIHF Council on May 20 ... Jim Smith, president of USA Hockey: Dave Ogrean, executive director of USA Hockey; and Gavin Regan, vice president of USA Hockey are all here for the remainder of the world championship after arriving in Moscow in time for the IIHF Annual Congress ... Team USA is 3-2 in games with a 4:15 p.m. start time (Canada, Hungary, France, Germany, Czech Republic) ... John Hynes and Mike Eaves are the only two individuals to serve as head coach of a U.S. team in the U18 Men's Worlds. World Juniors and Men's World Championship ... Team USA blocked 23 shots in its 2-1 quarterfinal shootout win over the Czech Republic on Thursday (May 19) ... The U.S. has advanced to the semifinals of the world championship for the second straight year, a feat that has happened just once before (1933-34). In addition, Team USA is in the semifinals for the third time in the last four years, an unprecedented streak for the country.

#### BACK FROM LAST YEAR

Team USA has four players back from its bronze-medal 2015 U.S. Men's National Team, including defenseman Connor Murphy, and forwards Dylan Larkin, Matt Hendricks (captain), and Brock Nelson. The 2015 squad won eight games at the world championship, the most of any U.S. team in a single men's world championship.

#### MEN'S WORLDS EXPERIENCE

Six players have experience playing in the IIHF Men's World Championship. The group includes four players that competed a year ago (Matt Hendricks, Dylan Larkin, Connor Murphy, Brock Nelson), as well as Jake McCabe and Nick Foligno.

#### PLAYING FOR TEAM USA

A total of 20 players on the 2016 U.S. Men's National Team have competed for Team USA at IIHF world championships in their career (U18, World Juniors, Men's Worlds). Below is a list with total games played heading into the 2016 IIHF Men's World Championship.
